All the materials used are recycled and can be recycled.



Collaging with packaging is a great way to do some creative recycling and working at scale can draw attention to your message. These big drawings

can be used for a display about your Litter Champions Club.



Large pieces of cardboard

A giant black marker or black paint and brush

Craft knife


Scissors


PVA glue and brushes

Recycling such as sweet and biscuit wrappers, cereal boxes, magazines...any paper and card recycling.

Prepare some 'big draw' items in advance. Ideas include giant cardboard R's, a trophy, a giant litter bin, a plastic bottle, fishes or turtles and the letters to spell out the name of your litter club.

2 Cut them out.







If you don't like drawing big, use a projector to upscale onto cardboard and paint over the projection.







Biros Felt tips

Thinking about the environment and climate can be overwhelming. Use the question, "How do you eat an elephant?" to discuss small changes and the big difference a school community can make by working together.

1 Ask the children to draw an Illustration from their imagination about "how you eat an elephant?"

The class can have fun with literal doodles but encouarge them to draw metaphorical doodles about how this phrase could apply to tackling litter.

Don't use pencil...lt makes the mark making slow and hesitant. Using pen makes bolder marks.

Collect some litter!

Place a piece on white paper so it stands out from any background.

Each student needs 3 bits of white paper and a black biro.

PEEKING! 4 For the first warm up, ask the students to get the paper and pen ready and have a good look at the object in front of them. They may wish to turn their paper to either landscape or portrait.

5 The students must close their eyes and use their non dominant hand to draw the object as best as they remember it! Time them for 1minute.


6 Using a fresh piece of paper for the second warm up, this time the students can open their eyes and use their correct hand... but they must not take their pen off the paper. This 1 minute drawing should be one long continuous line! The students should not take their eyes from the object so they only look at the object, not at their emerging drawing!

7 Now they are warmed up give the students 10 minutes to create a line

- 11 Remove the drawing and carbon copy carefully, lifting one corner to check you haven't missed anything you need.
- 12 Now use the black sharpie to make the lines bold.
- 13 You can use felt tips to add pattern and colour, along with any text encouraging people not to drop litter and to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle!
